



As they listen to what is going on in different congregations, themes begin to emerge about what God is doing in the midst of our churches and also the challenges that our churches are facing. Several years ago conference staff visited every congregation in Central Plains and out of those visits, themes emerged about what our churches feel that God is calling us

This led to the adoption of a mission statement for our conference: The mission of Central Plains Mennonite Conference is to create settings for our congregations and partners to grow in holistic witness to God's reconciling mission in the world

by developing leadership, encouraging fellowship, and promoting lifelong discipleship.

Once our staff had identified a mission and priorities, they went to work to develop a strategic plan that would give focus and shape to the work of conference as we sought to help congregations carry out God's reconciling mission in their contexts. This plan was adopted by the delegates in Moline in 2011 and it has guided us as a conference over the last three years.

You may have noticed that we have invited congregations to relate to one another through visiting other congregations and doing joint activities. We have worked hard to train volunteers to work alongside our staff to help search committees, assist with pastoral evaluations, and more recently formed the Conflict Management Support Team. We have developed the New Ministries Grant fund which allows individuals, committees and congregations the opportunity to access some seed money to experiment with new ideas for reaching out into their communities. An annual church planters gathering has also been established to support, train and develop those in our conference who are working at church planting.

Probably one of the most significant areas of development has been the creation of congregational partnerships to support leaders of developing congregations. Several established congregations will covenant to partner with developing congregations. While these partners do provide financial support to allow church planters more freedom to engage in their work, they do much more. Partners provide fellowship and learning opportunities for the congregations involved. The older churches bring a sense of history and continuity while the emerging churches bring a sense of energy, vibrancy and creativity.

These relationships contain the potential to develop leadership, fellowship and discipleship as we seek together what God might be calling us to be and to do as we engage with one another. And these relationships are made possible through the work of conference. If your church is not involved in one of these partnerships, talk to Dave and see what possibilities there might be to get involved in this way.

The work of conference is to support our member churches that together we may bear witness to God's reconciling work in our communities.



A new Partner in Mission

Philip Friesen brings his ministry home to Central Plains



On November 15, the Conference Board approved Philip Friesen as a Central Plains Mennonite Conference Partner in Mission. The purpose of the Partner in Mission designation is to link with groups or individuals with whom we have a spiritual and missional affinity that will mutually benefit us in carrying out God's mission. Through a relationship of trust and mutuality, we will seek to exchange gifts and enlarge the mission of one another.

Philip's ministry has involved evangelistic and service outreach to international scholars and visitors at the University of Minnesota since 1996. He has been a crossculture consultant who serves the international university community and raises his own support for this ministry.

Before serving in outreach to the community of international scholars who come from universities all over the world, Philip served as "English Pastor" in a local Taiwanese church for seven years, and before that he and his wife, Kim, spent ten years as Mennonite missionaries in Taiwan. Philip feels it is time to bring home the lessons he has learned over decades to the churches that nurtured and sent him, and that is why he has requested Partner in Mission relationship with Central Plains.

Peace and gospel are close to his heart, and in 2010 he published *The Old Testament Roots of Nonviolence*, after which he was invited for a short term to teach in a Presbyterian seminary in Cairo on this topic. Currently he is preparing material for speaking on peace and gospel and will be available to visit churches who would like thoughtful, biblical input on the topic. As a fellow for global perspectives in a small group of interdenominational scholars, Philip's writing is available at galileanfellows.org and on Facebook.

Philip is a member of Emmanuel Mennonite Church, Minneapolis, Minnesota, where he is the mission/service chair. He has many connections and partnership relationships, all involving evangelism. Two of these are Christians Meeting Muslims and the Wilberforce Academy, an organization that seeks to prepare Christian international scholars as witnesses in their places of leadership when they return to their home countries. —David Boshart, executive conference minister

As you can see from the graphs, November income didn't exceed expenses, but December's leap forward not only erased this small deficit, but put the conference in a net positive position (\$7,589.55) entering 2014.
